P&J Live is located close to Aberdeen International Airport, six miles northwest of the city centre, and just a few short minutes from the city's new western peripheral route. You can reach the venue using a range of transport options.

Please enter via Dyce Drive or A96 if travelling southbound, as other entry points are bus gates only. You may exit via all three exits, at the A96, Dyce Drive and Wellheads Drive.



P&J Live is located next to the newly opened AWPR, making it easily reached by road from the north and south 2,200 car parking spaces available on-site. The nearby rail station offers regular connections up and down the region, including into the main station in Aberdeen, which operates trains throughout Scotland, and across the UK, with sleeper services to London Euston.

Aberdeen operates 54 direct services daily, providing visitors with a range of options in getting to the city.
